5. īnsidiīs: īnsidiae, īnsidiārum, f. pl. (pl. only): ambush, plot, treachery
6. vitiārum: vitium, vitiī, n.: fault, crime, vice
7. poteram: possum, posse, potuī: to be able, can, could, have power
